- 1. The provision is for Secretariat expenditure of the Department of Drinking Water Supply.
- 2. The National Common Minimum Programme stipulates provision of drinking water for all rural habitations in the country. Government has been progressively increasing the Annual Central Outlay for the Rural Water Supply Sector over the years. Rural Drinking Water is one of the six components of Bharat Nirman, which has been conceived as a plan to build rural infrastructure in four years period from 2005-06 to 2008-09. Under Rural Drinking Water Component of Bharat Nirman, it is envisaged to cover all un-covered habitations through comprehensive action plan and also address the problem of slippage and water quality.

Efforts are being made to promote the two issues of sustainability and quality by monitoring the water quality. Details of different models of rain water harvesting have been distributed

- to the States for generating increased awareness about the same. A National Rural Water Quality Monitoring and Surveillance Programme for institutionalizing community based Water Quality Monitoring & Surveillance System was finalized and launched in February, 2006.
- 3. The Government continues to give utmost importance for supplementing the efforts of the State Governments to provide sanitation facilities to the rural masses. Sanitation Campaign Projects have been launched in 578 districts covering 30 States/ UTs. It is envisaged to cover all the districts with Total Sanitation Campaign by the end of the 11th Plan and to achieve the Millenium Development Goal of reducing by half, the number of people without access to sanitation by 2010.
- 4. Lump sum provision has been kept for projects schemes for the benefit of North Eastern Region and Sikkim.
